THE PARKING AUTHORITY OF TORONTO is a corporate body established in 1952 by Provincial Statute and City By-Law. It is comprised of a Chairman and two Commissioners who are appointed by, and responsible to, City Council.

The Authority is responsible for the establishment, operation and management of all municipal offstreet parking facilities throughout the City. It also operates carparks on leased lands and manages some carparks on a revenuesharing or fee basis. By Legislation the Authority is required to be self-sustaining representing no burden to the general taxpayer, and to pay real estate and business taxes, which in 1977 amounted to \$1,815,309.00. Even though the Authority purchases lands and buildings from its surplus or borrowed funds, title to these properties is vested in the City of Toronto.

The Authority is required to report annually to City Council, and its financial affairs must be examined and certified by the City Auditor.

The Authority provides carparks for the following purposes:

- to serve short-term parkers in the downtown core and the midtown;
- to serve all day parkers on the downtown fringe, at public transit stations including the east and west subway terminals;
- 3. to serve neighbourhood commercial/residential areas.

Your Commissioners are pleased to submit for your consideration the 1977 Annual Report of The Parking Authority of Toronto.

In the year under review, parkings at municipal carparks increased four percent over 1976, and gross revenue was \$9,331,329.00.

A detailed financial statement is included in this Report, on pages 5, 6 and 7. It will be noted from that statement that in accordance with the agreement adopted by Council at its meeting of May 12th, 1976, the Authority turned over to the City's general fund \$1,085,016, being 50% of the Authority's net operating surplus for 1977.

The Authority opened one new carpark in 1977, a surface facility of 38 spaces between Salem and Bartlett Avenues, north of Bloor Street West, built on surplus subway land leased from the Metropolitan Corporation.

The re-construction of municipal carpark 44, Fuller Avenue, north of Queen Street West, was completed in September, 1977. A reduction in the number of spaces at this location permitted a portion of this site to be turned over to the Parks Department for development as a neighbourhood park.

Construction of the 3-level extension to municipal carpark 11, the Rosehill Garage commenced in November 1977, and is expected to be completed in July, 1978. The extension will increase capacity at this garage to a total of 578 spaces. This additional capacity is expected to take some of the pressure off the Authority's two surface carparks in the Yonge/St. Clair area.

Holly Park Place, the award-winning parking and housing development between Holly Street and Dunfield Avenue, south of Eglinton Avenue East, is nearing completion, and it is expected that the garage component of 457 spaces will be opened for business in August, 1978. The Authority is pleased that this joint venture with the City's Housing Department has proceeded through the planning, implementation, and construction stages with a minimum of difficulty.

An agreement has been reached between the City and the Province for the land on which the Kensington Garage will be constructed commencing in the summer of 1978. The additional time required for the planning of this garage has delayed the start of construction beyond the original estimate. This was necessary to ensure that the garage will be capable of handling the short-term, high turn-over demand characteristic of the Market area, in addition to being aesthetically in harmony with the architecture of the surrounding market structures.

During the year the Authority continued its programme of providing



specially designed and marked parking spaces for disabled motorists at some of its municipal carparks. These special parking spaces are under-utilized at the present time, and the Authority is monitoring usage with a view to reporting more fully on the matter toward the end of 1978. In this regard, the Authority maintains close liaison with the City's Co-ordinator of the Programme on the Disabled and Elderly.

Expropriation proceedings have commenced for the acquisition of a site at the north-west corner of Eglinton Avenue West and Hillton Road on which will be established a metered surface carpark of about 30 spaces. A municipal carpark at this location is expected to help meet some of the short-term parking demand created by an active commercial/retail business strip. The parking problem in this area has been somewhat exacerbated by the redevelopment of some properties which had been used for parking purposes as an interim land use.

The Authority has recently concluded an agreement with Ontario Hydro for the lease of a property on Prescott Avenue, north of St. Clair Avenue West which will be developed in 1978 as a metered surface carpark to meet a demand for parking from the local residential and business community.

Plans have been laid for the modification in the late spring of 1978 of municipal carpark 16, Cumberland and Bellair Streets, to compliment the ambience of the Yorkville Village shopping area. Hanging planters, sidewalk widening, tree-planting, benches and decorative pavement are included in the plan.

The Authority is negotiating with the Metropolitan Corporation for the use of three surplus land sites at the junction of Eglinton Avenue West and the William R. Allen Road on which it is proposed to establish carparks to serve the adjacent business community and to provide a limited capacity change-of-mode parking facility. The Authority is of the opinion that there is a requirement for a large capacity parking structure to serve the Spadina subway line, and that the best location for such a structure is over the William R. Allen Road immediately south of the Glencairn Station.

Much time has been spent with representatives of the City's Planning and Housing Departments on plans for the redevelopment of municipal carpark 43 within the St. Lawrence neighbourhood project. The plan is to consolidate the existing inventory of 1,250 municipal parking spaces, now contained in three large surface carparks, into a multi-level above-ground parking



garage and residential/commercial structure.

The provision of parking facilities for the westward expansion of Chinatown continues to present a problem. As part of an exhaustive search for solutions, the Authority is now working on a concept for a parking garage under Spadina Avenue in cooperation with other interested City Departments.

The demand for area parking studies throughout the City has increased over the year, and at the time of writing, some fourteen studies are scheduled. The lack of suitable lands on which to establish neighbourhood carparks was observed on in the 1976 Report. In this regard, the Authority is concerned that any move by the Metropolitan Corporation to change its present policy on the use of surplus subway lands will greatly affect our ability to deliver parking services to neighbourhood retail strips where a parking study determines there is a demand.

To mark its 25th Anniversary of parking operations, the Authority hosted a reception in the City Hall Rotunda on June 1st, 1977, and it was our pleasure on this occasion to welcome many people with whom the Authority has worked and been associated over the years.

Again this year we take this opportunity to express our thanks to the many civic officials, agencies, and members of their staffs with whom the Authority and its staff enjoy such good working relationships in the service of the citizens of this great City.

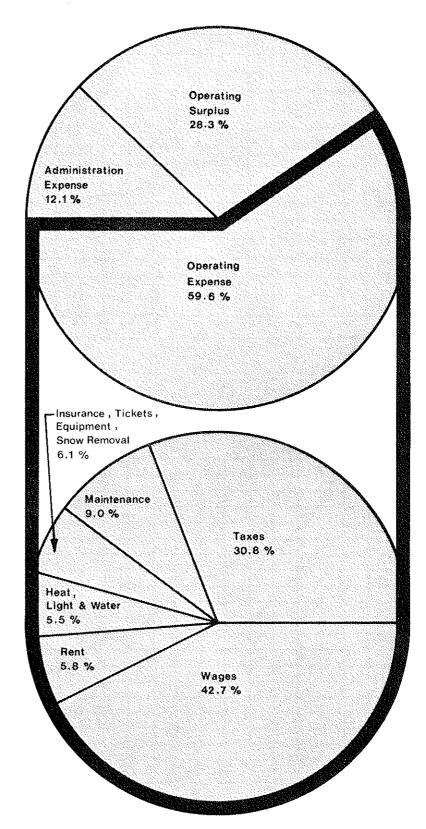

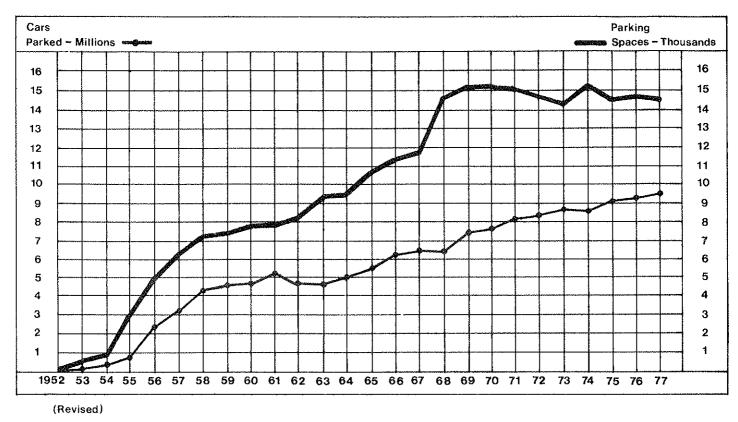
How the income dollar was spent:

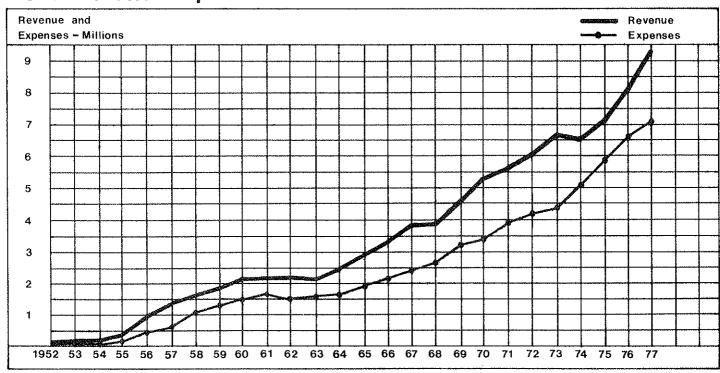


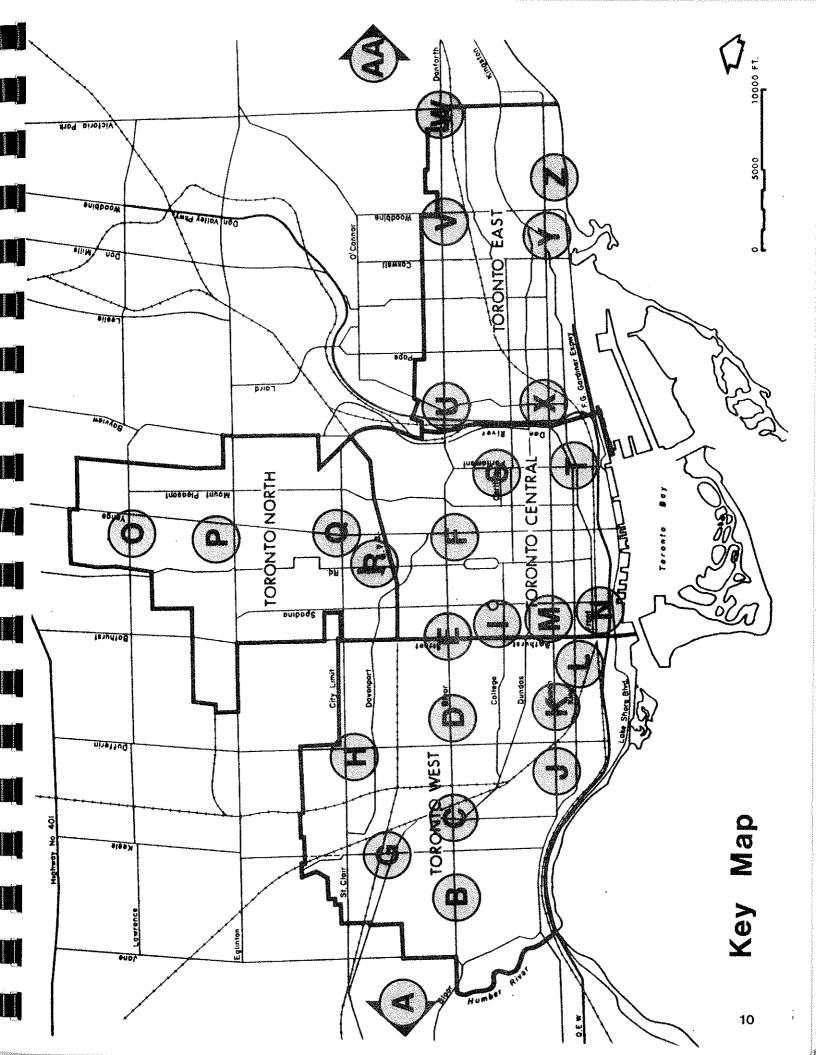
Municipal Parking Spaces and Cars Parked

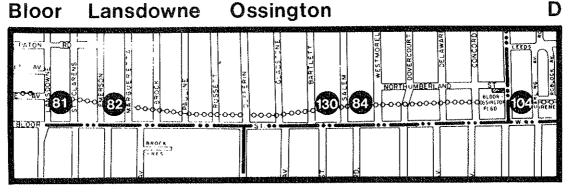


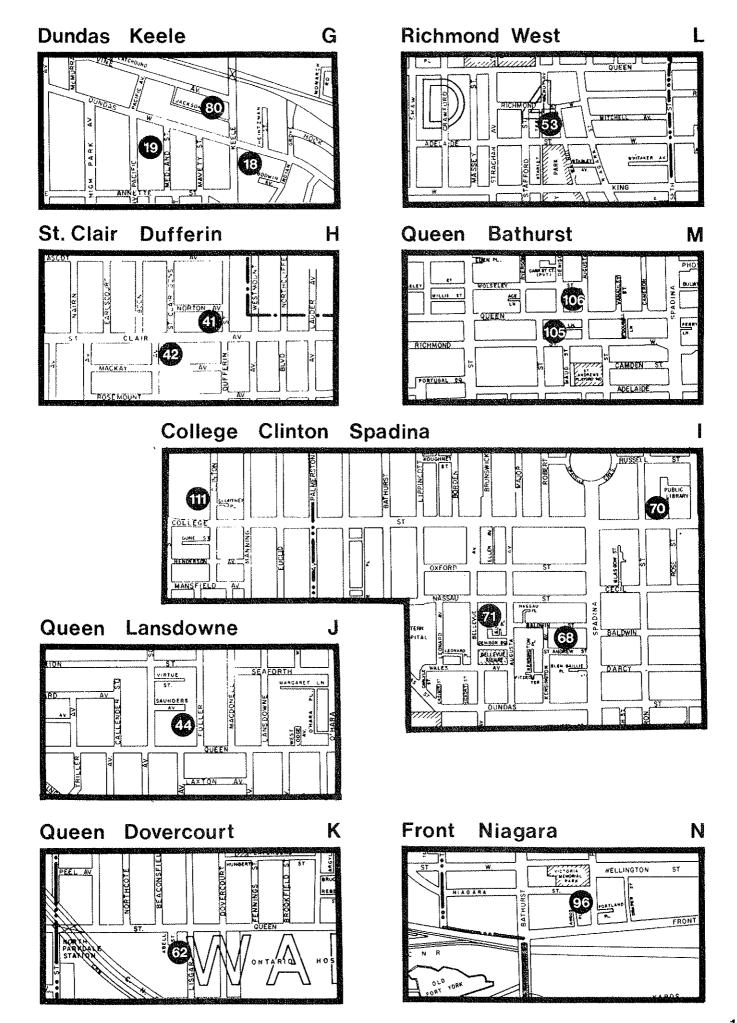


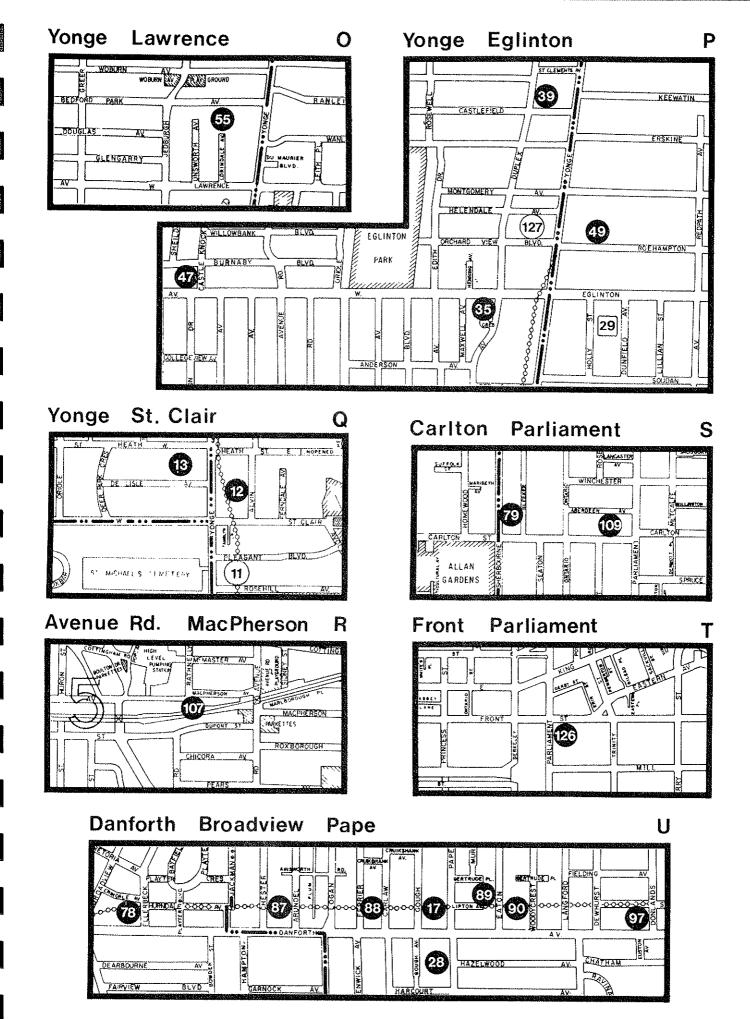
